The Lone Peak Conservation Center, and the Utah Department of Natural Resources have multiple seasonal crewmember positions open on the Dromedary Peak Fuels Crew for the 2017 fire season. Assignment location: Lone Peak Conservation Center 271 W Bitterbrush Lane, Draper, Utah 84020.

Employment duration: May through mid August for students, non students may have the opportunity to work through the end of October depending on the season.

Position Qualification Requirements: Applicants must have the minimum qualification of Type 2 Wildland firefighter (FFT2).

Position Description and Crew Overview:

The Dromedary Peak Fuels Crew is seeking highly motivated and physically fit individuals. Applicants with strong character, those who treat others with respect, and demonstrate a high level of personal responsibility are encouraged to apply. Crewmembers will be expected to remain accountable for their actions and for all equipment issued to them.

Dromedary Peak crewmembers may participate in all aspects of fire suppression assignments

including initial attack, extended attack, fire line construction, hose lay construction, firing and holding operations, chainsaw operations, and mop-up. When not assigned to a wildland fire incident, the crew regularly conducts pre-suppression fuels reduction projects, and other duties as designated.

Dromedary Peak is currently a Type II hand crew created by Utah Forestry, Fire, and State Lands. **The goal for the 2017 season is to status the crew as a permanent Type II Initial Attack hand crew.** Established in 2007, the crew has taken its name, Dromedary Peak, from a peak in the Wasatch mountain range. The primary focus of the crew is to build solid, well-rounded wildland firefighters through wildland fire suppression assignments and pre-suppression fuels reduction work. When not committed to a fire assignment the crew uses chainsaws and other equipment to complete fuels management work throughout the State of Utah. The crew is available nationally for fire assignment all season.



The Lone Peak Conservation Center:

The diversity of the Lone Peak Conservation Center provides a great platform for career advancement, cross training, leadership development, and detail opportunities. Total workforce at the conservation center is around 120 employees, with 28 full time staff and is home to: the Dromedary Peak Fuels Crew, Twin Peaks IA, Alta Hotshots, the Lone Peak Hotshots, and two Type 3 Engines. During the 2016 fire season Dromedary Peak was able to detail 4 individuals onto other resources outside of the crew.



On-Call Pay:

During scheduled days off, while the crew is available for fire dispatch, crew-members must stay within 2 hours of the duty station, and employees will be compensated for doing so by receiving on-call pay. The rate for on-call pay is one hour of base pay for every 12 hours of on-call status. Essentially, for every 80 hours of work (not on fire assignment) if employees remain on-call when not physically at work, employees are paid for about 100 hours at their base wage rate. This compensates employees for remaining within a 2 hour response area when not at work.

Local Information:

Utah is a very geographically diverse state with the desert starting just west of the Salt Lake Valley and the Wasatch Mountains bordering to the east. A few hours north east of Salt Lake City is the Uinta Mountain Range. The Moab area and Zion National Park are within a 4-5 hour drive south east of Salt Lake City. As a result of this geographic diversity here in Utah, we see wildfires burn in a wide range of fuel types exhibiting different fire behavior.

Approximately 1 million people live in the Salt Lake Valley and along the Wasatch Front. The cities of Ogden, Park City, Salt Lake City, Orem, and Provo are all within a 1-2 hour drive from the Lone Peak Conservation Center in Draper. Elevations in Northern Utah range from about 4,000 feet in the valley bottoms to over 11,000 feet in the mountains. Precipitation ranges from less than 15 inches to approximately 50 inches at the higher elevations. Utah is well known for the “Greatest Snow on Earth”, and as a result offers 9 world-class resorts within a 1.5 hour drive from downtown Salt Lake City. All of these resorts offer both summer and winter recreation opportunities. In addition to the resorts, the Wasatch Mountains offer a multitude of trailheads for use in all four seasons.
